The student must have completed and passed the pre-clinical curriculum.

Rotation Description (2 elective credit hours)

Students will:

- Be immersed in the multiple, practical facets and skill areas of a small animal, general practice to include vaccinology, infectious diseases, parasitology, nutrition, communications, dentistry, dermatology, preventative care, routine surgery, business, dealing with common illnesses and aspects of animal behavior.
- Develop skills in dealing with clients to include verbal and written communications
- Develop skills in animal handling and physical examination
- Participate in preventive health care protocols
- Perform medical and behavioral assessments

General Expectations for Student Citizenship on the Extramural Elective Rotation

- Case care/treatments as permitted/expected by the practice
- Participate in clinical case rounds as available
- Assist with appointments, diagnostic workups, and treatments
- Assist in surgery and observe when not scrubbed for procedures
- Complete medical records when appropriate
- Complete discharge summaries
- Act professionally and ethically always

Minimum time allocation expectations follow:

You are expected to be present by/before 8:00 AM on assigned workdays. You will not be assigned to work the Monday of block change, but orientation will be the first day beginning at noon. Students will typically be assigned four 10-hour workdays per week, but the schedule may vary depending on clinic needs.

Typical two-week schedule (may change due to weather or holidays).

First Mon orientation: noon

Tues-Friday 8-6pm

Sat/Sunday off

2nd week: M-Thurs – 8-6 or 7pm

Friday – Sunday off

NOTE: For students on rotations over a holiday they will be emailed an individual schedule. Saturday hours may be assigned to meet rotational goals and depending on the clinic need

Quitting time each day depends on completing your daily duties and helping the clinicians finish their daily responsibilities. You must check with the clinicians and technicians before leaving each day. Travel and Housing

Location/Housing

Eagle Animal Hospital has four sites in Noth Kansas City. Here is the website for more information on the locations: <https://www.eagleanimalhospital.com/locations>. Students could commute each day or use the hospital owned apartment at the Liberty location (dependent on availability). There is no emergency duty and no assigned duties on OFF days so that students may return to the Columbia area.

Grading Policy

Grading in the VMS 6710 extramural community practice rotation is performed by the supervising veterinarian and forwarded to the course instructional leader for official recording at MU. 60% of the grade will be based on the subjective performance in the following categories and 40% will be based on a written quiz or project assigned by the clinic.

Failure in the Professionalism category will result in an F grade for the rotation regardless of other performance.
